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Introduction

1.General Reports

This is the eighteenth annual report of the Parish of Blackwell, a parish that finally became a legal entity on All Saints' Day, 1998. The Annual Report is a collection of individual reports from the different people, committees and groups involved with this Parish Church, and they show, as in previous years, just how much goes in to the organising of worship, the extending of a pastoral and teaching ministry to the gathered congregations and wider parish, and the service of the community. This is a full expression of the ministry we are all involved in here – and you will find that the reports that are included range from those of the PCC (the Secretary's) and its committees, to those of groups and charities that we support as a parish. There are also those that give an insight into wider organisations and groupings of which this parish is a part or with which it is closely connected, such as the West Darlington Group of Parishes, the Deanery Synod and the Millennium Centre Trust Company. I hope that all the reports included will be read by regular worshippers and by a good number of parishioners and friends as well. I do hope that you will take the time to read all those that are here and to pray for those who are involved in all the different activities, groups and organisations.

Once again, the full report will be published on the parish website in an attempt to be wiser stewards of the world's resources and reduce the number of copies that need to be printed.

I am grateful to those people who have taken time and care to write reports and I am especially grateful to Dee Wastnedge, who was instrumental in producing this Annual Report.

Vicar's Report

This is my first contribution to the Annual Report as Vicar of this parish — although rather unusually, it will be my second Annual Meeting! At the interview for the post, back in November 2014, the candidates were asked to prepare a talk on what their priorities would be if given the post. I remember quoting the title of a book a friend had given me called 'Hit the ground kneeling'. This book, written by Stephen Cotterell, Bishop of Chelmsford, encourages people new in role, whatever that role is, to be active listeners — not to come in to a post tilting at windmills and ripping up trees, but listening and discerning for a time (most helpfully a year) before acting. This allows you to see every season, to see where God is already at work, to save you from spoiling the good things while trying to address the less good. This is what I have tried to do, and perhaps you might judge how successful I've been!

That being said, it has been a very busy and full year, with much to celebrate, much to give thanks for, with many possibilities and challenges ahead.

Gratitude

At the end of this first year I wish, in my report to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, to express my gratitude to the parish for the warm welcome we received as a family, and for the huge amount of support we have received through the last 12 months. It wasn't a small change for us moving from Derbyshire up to the North East, but apart from the break-in at the Vicarage a few weeks after we arrived, everyone has been very kind and welcoming, and it is very much appreciated.

The Ministry Group

As I say thank you to everyone for your support, there are people who I must single out. Inevitably, I cannot name everyone, but I must mention the Ministry Team – the Clergy and Readers associated with this Parish and Coniscliffe too. The Revds. Brian Holmes and Robin Fletcher were stalwarts through the vacancy, and their support for the parish, and me personally has been unwavering. The Revd Deborah Robinson, the Associate Minister for Coniscliffe is an important member of the team, and I have enjoyed working with Deborah over the past months, and look forward to watching her ministry flourish. In December last year, we welcomed the Revd Sarah Jay as Associate Minister at All Saints, and I look forward to working with Sarah too. Both Deborah and Sarah do the majority of their ministry in their day to day employment – Deborah at St Teresa's hospice, and Sarah in the NHS.

The Readers are an invaluable part of parish life, and I am extremely grateful to them: Debby Gill, Susan Leatherbarrow, Keith Whiston, Kevin Winkworth and Sarah Cliff. Again, the Readers did much to keep the worship in the parish on track during the vacancy, and have been a great source of support this last year. Each Reader, though, makes a distinctive and invaluable contribution to Church life, in addition to juggling many demands in their lives. I was licensed as a Reader before being ordained, so I appreciate what a wonderful job they each do.

Another important member of the Ministry Group is Katie Hollis, our Youth and Children's Minister. Katie spends part of her time working at Hummersknott School and Coniscliffe School, and the rest looking after our Junior Church, Youth Fellowship and Toddler Group. In what is a difficult climate for all churches working with young people and families and with so many pressures on young people's time, our groups will only grow and flourish if parents are committed to taking advantage of all that the church offers and by encouraging their children to flourish in a supportive Christian community. But, the need is for commitment – to regularly being at church and taking part in the various groups, activities and services on offer.

The Church Officers

I am very grateful to our four wardens for the fantastic job each has done over the last year, not least in each chairing and leading an important PCC committee: Andrew Watson, Community Outreach Committee; Helen Newell, Finance Committee; Andy Hopkins, Social Committee; Sally Johnson, Buildings and Grounds Committee. The wardens exercise their office with diligence and enthusiasm, and we can all be grateful for the role they play.

I am grateful to our two treasurers for their continued excellent service to the church. Being treasurer of a Church like All Saints' is a very demanding role, which should not be taken for granted, and we are enormously blessed to have someone as accomplished as Peter Davison in this role. Peter is admirably supported by the Planned Giving Treasurer, Ellis Leatherbarrow. In a difficult year, Ellis has had to be both determined and creative, and has continued to work towards increasing the number of members of the planned giving scheme, and how much each member gives.

As you will know, the PCC Treasurer has to work very closely with the Millennium Trust Finance Director. The Trust is a separate legal entity from the Church, but because of the integrated nature of the buildings, the accounting arrangement can sometimes be complicated and involved. It is a happy coincidence that Pam Davison (Peter's wife) is the Millennium Trust Finance Director, and I'm sure that this contributes to the good working relationship between Trust and PCC.

The last people I would like to thank in this section are Alison Hardy, the PCC Secretary, and Dee Wastnedge, who has stood in as secretary on the occasions that Alison couldn't make it because of studying commitments. The PCC simply cannot function without efficient and able secretarial support.

The Parish Secretary

Nicky Waller, the Parish Secretary, makes a huge – often unseen – contribution to parish life. She has a vast knowledge of what happens and needs to happen in the ongoing life of All Saints' and Salutation, and her support and help have been invaluable to me as I get to grips with all that goes on in the parish.

Caretaker

I am grateful to our caretaker, Gary Fowler, for his work in looking after the locking up and cleaning of the hall during the year, and to the people who stand in for Gary when he is off. It is also appropriate at his point, to thanks all those who look after the gardens and church. With so many people using the building throughout the week, it is vital that the grounds and building are kept looking as good as possible.

The Parish Vision

To Grow God's Kingdom through All Saints' and Salutation, Blackwell.

We believe God is calling us to do this by:

Growing the Church, growing as Disciples, growing in Service to the parish and beyond.

The Parish Vision was first developed in 2009 and refreshed as the Parish Profile was written. It remains the vision of the church

Growing the Church

Work has also continued through all of the committees to promote church growth. Communications continue to be reviewed and the website refined. A weekly email is sent to those requesting it with the Weekly Herald (pew sheet) attached. During 2015 this was updated to an electronic version including more detail and extra articles of interest each week – and currently over 200 people receive this eNewsletter each week.

Following a decline in numbers attending Sunday services last year (2014), this year saw some stabilising of attendance and modest growth as the year progressed. Consideration needs to be given as to how this growth can be sustained and built upon, and in particular how the decline numbers of young people can be reversed. Despite that decline, there are still good number of youngsters involved in the church as members of the choir, as altar servers, and as part of the Sunday School, and they must be encouraged and affirmed. Consideration should also be given to developing the ministry around occasional offices — which includes baptisms, weddings and funerals — all of which take place in the church throughout the year. We can be grateful to our Musical Director and Organist Jeremey Maritz, and the choir, for their ministry of music throughout the year. This too may serve as a possible focus for growth in years ahead.

Growing as Disciples

It is generally acknowledged that churches do not grow if their members are not growing in faith, taking regular worship, prayer and bible study seriously. The previous initiatives relating to prayer have helped to

encourage personal spiritual growth and faithfulness, as have the well-attended Lent Groups and other home discussion and prayer groups.

Regular church attendance by all electoral roll members continues to be a great challenge for All Saints' and indeed all churches. Many people lead busy and demanding lives, of course, and the church needs to provide opportunities for discipleship development in ways that are not impossible even for the busiest of souls to access. But commitment to regular worship is fundamental if we are serious about growing in discipleship. The Worship Committee and the Ministry Group have continued to provide a wide variety of worship styles and times to enable the largest possible number of people to participate frequently in worship. The church does need to rise to the challenge of how we encourage discipleship amongst the younger members of the church and community, and how we encourage people of all ages in faithful regular attendance.

Growing as a disciple involves considering one's vocation - how God is calling a person to live and what he is asking him or her to do. The Shared Ministry Development Group continues to consider how to encourage people in their sense of vocation.

Growing in discipleship also includes taking the full breadth of Christian Stewardship seriously. This inevitably includes financial support of the church. A brief Stewardship campaign was held in September which resulted in an increase in the Planned Giving, for which the church is grateful, but more will need to be done in the months ahead. We are richly blessed by the work of the Treasurers of both the Millennium Trust and PCC.

Growing in Service

The Millennium Centre (managed through a separate trust company) and Salutation Hall continue to be an important way in which this Christian community serves the needs of the wider community in which it is set. We are grateful to the caretaker, Gary Fowler and all the volunteers from the church who make the offering of these facilities possible. We are very grateful to Dee Wastnedge for her work as booking secretary for both halls, and to Alison Barker for her sterling work as Trust Secretary. Both the Centre and the Hall are well used and provide invaluable service to the community. The efforts of the Building's and Ground's Committee to care for these buildings as well as the church and its grounds was appreciated hugely by the PCC.

It is important to note that service to others is offered by regular worshippers in countless ways each day through paid and voluntary work, through untold acts of charity, and through care for family and friends. Our Parish Share contribution of £94,000 also helped to provide ministry for communities in the Diocese of Durham where this would otherwise be impossible to fund. The principle of mutuality is essential to the spirituality and ministry of the Church of England: The Church is here for everyone because some use their God-given resources to provide it for others.

Amongst many examples of this church's service are: pastoral visiting (supported by a Pastoral Assistant and a team of dedicated parish visitors); the Pre-School Group (which continues to go from strength to strength, thanks to the hard work of the staff and management committee); the Toddler Group; and the Parish Lunch. The existence of the Traidcraft Stall indicates a desire to promote trade justice. There are many charities supported through the work of individual members of the congregation, and it is important to acknowledge all that people do, and to support them, not least through our prayers.

Our care of God's Creation has been promoted more effectively in recent years by the Green Action Group. As the Group begins to work towards achieving the status of Eco-Congregation for the church, a very generous gift from a parishioner enabled solar-pv panels to be fitted to the roof of the millennium Centre, which will reduce the cost of electricity used, and will make the hall far more environmentally friendly. The ministry at All Saints' Church was enhanced in the latter part of the year as Revd. Sarah Jay joined the parish as an Associate Minister. The team of Readers, retired ministers, Youth Minister, and now Sarah, mean that we are well resourced, and blessed by the variety and talent of those ministering here.

Into the future

So, this brief review of how we have made advances in the areas of our Parish Vision can provide encouragement and many reasons for thanking God. While we are richly blessed in our buildings, our worship, and most of all in the many remarkable people associated with the Parish Church, there is still much to do to develop our worship, discipleship and service. There are no shortages of opportunity and challenge, and the only way we will continue to develop and grow as Christians and as a church, is through working together, recognising and developing the gifts and talents of each person, and empowering all as we seek to grow God's kingdom.

We have much to celebrate, much for which to give thanks – and while we have looked back on the past year in this report, let us now look forward to the future. Let us be confident of God's presence with us, and in this confidence, let us strive always to be the people God is calling us to be, let us strive to grow God's kingdom in this place.

Shared Ministry

The Shared Ministry Development Group has the responsibility of helping the Church to discern where there are opportunities for ministry and mission, and also of spotting the people who are possibly being called to contribute with their talents. It is also the group within the parish that encourages the fostering and discerning of vocation. Each Christian disciple has a vocation: God is calling him or her to become a particular person and to fulfil certain roles. For some of us this will involve ministry or service near the centre of the Church's life; for others it will be lived out mostly in the world – at home, at work, or through charitable interests.

While the group didn't meet regularly during the vacancy, it met more four times last year and will continue to develop in its role in to the future.

Annual Report of the Children's and Youth Minister

The position of Children's and Youth Minister has a number of different roles which are detailed within this report. This has also expanded once again this year to provide support at High Coniscliffe CE Primary School.

Junior Church

Junior Church continues to meet each Sunday during term time. Numbers have dropped slightly, and we are working on ways to improve this. Many thanks go out to our most valuable team of volunteer leaders who continue to provide enjoyable sessions to children and young people accessing Junior Church.

We invited children from Abbey Federation of Schools once again to join us for this year's nativity. Grateful thanks to Emma de la Motte and all those who helped for their support with the nativity.

Messy Church

We hold a monthly Messy Church on Sunday mornings, which usually takes place during the 10:30 service on the first Sunday of the month. This continues to be popular with young families who attend and have again seen new families accessing Messy Church this year. In the coming months we are looking to hold a family friendly service on an afternoon to encourage more young families to attend church.

Youth Fellowship

Youth Fellowship provides young people of confirmation age and above opportunity to meet. Following discussions, it was agreed to be reduced this year from weekly to monthly sessions as a result of a significant drop in numbers. We continue to meet monthly either in the Millennium Hall or for off site events. Youth Fellowship are also invited to join in deanery events organised by DACYM (Darlington Area Churches Youth Ministry) which include outdoor activities such as kayaking, canoeing and mountain walking alongside a short act of worship. We are also establishing links with the youth of Holy Trinity and are looking forward to meeting with them for sessions and events.

Traidcraft

The Traidcraft stall offers Fairtrade goods on a Sunday morning after most 10:30 services. Junior Church members have supported the running of the stall which is also available at events including the Garden Party and the Christmas Fayre. I also run a Traidcraft stall once per term with the students at Hummersknott Academy as part of their fairtrade policy. The stalls at Hummersknott continue to be very successful.

Toddler Groups

The toddler groups allow parents and carers to bring their children to play and meet other young families. Tuesday afternoon sessions are directed towards children aged 2-4 years old; and Friday morning sessions consist mainly of babies and toddlers aged up to about two and a half. Approximately 8 children attend Tuesday group and Friday group is based on a membership of currently around 20 babies and toddlers. Due to our members' support we are able to cover our costs (hall fees, refreshments, crafts, replacement of toys and special events) and we also sponsor a child, Lwiza, through the World Vision programme. Parents and carers also help to run our toy stall at the Garden Party and bran tub at the Christmas Fayre. Thanks from myself and parents and carers go out to our wonderful volunteers who continue to help with refreshments. Anne Willson's scone week proves to be the highlight of the toddler group calendar! Thanks also go out to Dawn, who provides fun crafts for children on Tuesdays.

Play and Praise

Once a month the Friday toddler group join the Pre-School children for the Play and Praise service held in church. Play and Praise sessions include bible stories, activities and songs for young children. David and I then deliver a similar session at High Coniscliffe Pre-School later in the morning.

Open the Book

Our Open the Book team consists of volunteer storytellers from Blackwell and Coniscliffe parishes. Open the Book is a three-year rolling programme of themed and dramatised Bible storytelling to primary schools. We present these stories to Abbey Federation of Schools and High Coniscliffe CE Primary School as part of their assemblies and collective worship. We have received lots of praise from school staff and pupils for our Open the Book storytelling. Thank you to the team for their continued hard work. I am now also able to offer training and support to other parishes wanting to establish Open the Book teams in the area.

Hummersknott Academy

I continue to work within the Achievement Centre at Hummersknott Academy through small group interventions, and the RE department by assisting with off site visits. I run two lunchtime clubs with Martin

and Mel Stand of DACYM (Darlington Area Churches Youth Ministry) and also support the Harvest Festival and Christmas, Easter and Fairtrade assemblies. I'm also a member of the Governing Body's Community Committee.

High Coniscliffe CE Primary School

From September 2015, I began working in High Coniscliffe CE Primary School to provide pastoral and worship support. I plan and deliver weekly collective worship (assemblies) based on the weekly lectionary readings. I organise the termly school church services and also work with nurture groups. Last term I arranged a prayer spaces event, providing each classroom with a different creative prayer activity each day. St Mary's Cockerton CE Primary School and St. Aidan's Academy also ran similar activities during the same week. Pupils from all three schools were joined by Bishop Mark at St. Aidan's for a celebratory Act of Worship on our prayer spaces. Due to the success of this week I'm looking to provide more permanent creative prayer activities in each classroom at High Coniscliffe.

Lesotho

In October I was lucky enough to travel to Lesotho with a team from Durham Lesotho Link and Bishop Paul. My role was being part of the youth team, providing support and training to over 60 youth workers in various areas of Lesotho. Many thanks to all who helped fundraise for this. On my return I have raised awareness of the issues faced in Lesotho through my work in schools and by preaching at St. Edwin's.

Over the past year we have faced challenges with the quantity of children and young people accessing groups and services at church. We are working to improve this and the support I continue to receive from the Ministry Team, volunteers and the congregation is most valuable and gratefully received. I continue to thoroughly enjoy my role here at All Saints'.

Worship Committee

It has been another busy year for this Committee, but thankfully with the arrival of our new Vicar, Debby Gill was able to relinquish the role of Acting Chair, and return to the position of Secretary. The following were some of the items discussed during the four meetings which took place:

- After many years of dedicated service to this Committee and indeed to other roles at All Saints', Enid Smith tendered her resignation, and grateful thanks to Enid for all her work were noted.
- Parade services. Poor attendance over a period of time had caused some anxiety, especially with
 one in particular of the uniformed organisations. However, over the year, the Vicar has been visiting
 the groups and bridges are being re-built, and it is hoped that there will be an improvement in
 communications. It was finally agreed that there would be four and not three Parade services each
 year: Mothering Sunday, Harvest, Remembrance Sunday and one other.
- Servers. There had been a problem with non-attendance from a number of the young servers, and this was addressed. In addition, some adults had agreed to become servers, and this new combination was working well, after the training sessions.

- The Lent Course for 2016 was not to be a York Course, as these were not always "stretching" the groups, so one based on implementing the Parish Vision of encouraging discipleship was to be used instead. During the Sunday evening services, there was to be a series of talks, after evening prayer, on the subject of "Christian Heroes". At the 10.30am services, the Lenten Prose was to be used.
- During Holy Week, there would be services of holy communion each day: Monday and Tuesday at 7.00pm, and Wednesday at 10.00 am, (with the first 12 Stations of the Cross); Maundy Thursday at 7.30pm followed by the Vigil; Good Friday (using the Reserved Sacrament), and a new (to All Saints') service on Holy Saturday evening, with the First Eucharist of Easter, and the renewal of baptismal vows. There would also be Compline after the Passover Meal on the Wednesday evening.
- Back to Church Sunday was held on 20th September, but was not to be a single event, but part of a
 "Season of Invitation", with additional events to which invitations to friends can be offered, such as
 to Harvest, Remembrance Sunday, Advent, and Christmas services. People are more likely to come
 back to church if they are invited more than once.
- Links with Elm Ridge have been appreciated, and will hopefully continue to grow. In particular, the Elm Ridge Choir members came to join with All Saints' Choir for the Advent Service of Light, and there were joint services during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.
- New microphones have been organised by Jeremy Maritz, and they are a vast improvement on the old ones; but there are still a few glitches in the sound system to be ironed out, including the occasional "booming". The Loop system is working well, but a resolution to the problem of the "black hole" in the sanctuary, where output from the mics cannot be heard properly, is still under review.
- The recommendation of the PCC to the Worship Committee: "During 2015 2016 the PCC particularly asks this committee to monitor and develop the standard of the Liturgy and to look at 'one-off' and occasional services. This committee should also look at how we might involve children and young people in services." There is to be open discussion in the committee, with a view to working out strategies to enable this to happen.
- Our link with the Hamburg churches. Pastorin Gabriele Voigt came to join us for our Remembrance Sunday Parade service, as she was visiting for a conference on baptism in Durham.
- On Armistice Day our usual 10.00am communion service began at 10.45am so that the formal act of remembrance could link up with the national observation of the two-minutes' silence.
- There was a memorial service held in memory of Claudia Lawrence at All Saints', in recognition of her mother's links with the church.
- The monthly service at The Gardens Care Home was discussed, and this was to be considered further at the Ministry Group, as regards using a slightly simplified liturgy, and the Vicar was to discuss with Rev. Dr Andrew Stobart the work that Elm Ridge does there too.
- Confirmation classes will be held as usual in 2016, but with the young people who were confirmed last year being invited back to join the new candidates for further teaching and nurture.
- Youth Fellowship is to have more of a structured input, half social and half faith-based, so as to make it more meaningful.

• Information was given regarding Bishop Paul's Prayer Walk around the Deanery at Ascensiontide. There is a very detailed itinerary, and all are welcome to join the walk at any point. There will be services at Sadberge and finally at All Saints' when the walk is concluded.

As I have written each year, the Readers' life is never dull, and if anyone reading this feels that they would like to explore this ministry, please get in touch with the Vicar, so that you can explore your calling. You may think that there are enough of us to do the work that needs to be done, but "the fields are white for harvest, and the labourers are few". We want to see God's Kingdom grow here, and across the Deanery.

It has to be said, also, that without the faithful prayers of the congregation, and support from David and the rest of our clergy, we would not be able to do the things that we do. It is a privilege and a joy. Thank you.

3. Stewardship: Finances & Grounds Reports

PCC Treasurers Report

It is disappointing to report that 2015 was not a very successful year for the Church's finances. Details of the results are shown in the extracts from the Annual Report and Financial Statements included under 'Abridged Accounts' later in this document.

The Statement of Financial Activities indicates that there was an overall deficit for the year, with expenditure exceeding income by £13,952. This compares to the surplus of £5,611 achieved in 2014, a negative turnaround of £19,563.

Unrestricted income has fallen from £226,720 in 2014 to £206,477 in 2015, a drop of £20,243. The majority of this was caused by a reduction in Planned Giving in 2015 which, including the amounts we are able to reclaim through gift aid, amounted to a shortfall of £15,109 in overall Planned Giving.

Unrestricted costs decreased slightly in the year from £221,681 in 2014 to £220,642 in 2015. Included in these costs is our Parish Share payment to the Diocese. We pledged to pay £94,000 in 2015 and I am very pleased to announce that, once again, we paid this amount in full, as we always have done, a very commendable achievement for our Parish.

Full details of our income and expenditure during the year are provided in the extracts.

Fundraising during the year was, once again, excellent with a total raised of £14,578 (2014: £14,202). This includes £3,079 from the Garden Party, £3,567 from the Christmas Fair and £1,000 from the Strawberry & Wine evening.

We have continued with our Charitable Mission and Giving throughout the year and I am pleased to report that we gave over £23,300 to good causes during 2015.

Details of both of these items are again included in the extracts.

We have many groups within our Church which as well as social activities also provide funds for the Church. These include Tea and Coffee (£876); Social Committee (£2,008); 100 Club (£1,087) and Bell Ringers who raised £2,336 during the year enabling them to make a donation of £2,000 to the Alzheimer's Society. In addition, our Pre-School had another successful year producing a surplus of £3,895 on top of a surplus of £9,358 in 2014, a tremendous achievement by all those associated with the Pre-School.

The deficit for the year has resulted in our Total Net Assets at the end of the year decreasing to £67,012 (2014: £80,964). We have an Unrestricted Fund of £63,781 and Restricted Funds of £3,231.

I repeatedly reported during 2015 that the deficit we were expecting would severely deplete our cash resources and this turned out to be the case. Although our Balance Sheet indicates that we ended the year with a bank balance of £65,421 it must be noted that 1) a large amount of this belongs to the Pre-School as a result of grants received in advance for 2016, 2) our creditors significantly exceeded debtors and 3) we are holding £3,231 in the Restricted Funds. Consequently, our true bank balance at the year-end was only

approximately £10,000 compared with £28,000 at the end of 2014. Another deficit in 2016 will give us severe cash flow problems.

Therefore, we must either increase income or reduce expenditure or, if possible both, to restrict the outflow of our cash resources.

We have pledged £94,500 to the Diocese for our 2016 Parish Share contribution. This is a substantial amount of money but it is vital for the Diocese to enable it to continue to support all of its churches. The Diocese has actually requested parishes to consider increasing their share payments in 2016 by 5% in order for it to continue to move forward in its present setup, which would mean us increasing our payment to £98,700, somewhat more than we have pledged!

I would welcome any suggestions on how we can increase income and/or reduce expenditure.

Finally, I would like to thank the Finance Committee and everyone else for all the support and encouragement I receive.

Planned Giving

You will note from the 2015 accounts to be presented by the Treasurer at the APCM that we show a drop in Planned Giving (before tax reclaim) of £11527.00 compared to the figure received in 2014.

The main reason for the drop in Planned Giving for the last year was the drop in Occasional Giving

2015: £6250

2014: £21770 (£5000 donation received for the Vicar's vestry works)

2013: £8085 2012: £13116

Since I took over as Planned Giving Treasurer in April 2014 we have lost 12 planned givers (4 died, 3 moved away, 1 in nursing care, 4 worshipping at a different church) giving a reduction of £9210 (before tax reclaim) in our income. In the period up to September 2015 we had an increase of £1140 (before tax reclaim) in giving, from 6 new members of the scheme. Following the September campaign, we have recorded an increase of £11248 (before tax reclaim), giving a net increase in Planned Giving of £3178 – approx. £4000 after tax reclaim. We have a projected budget deficit of £13000 for the coming year.

This represents an increase in giving by 34 people (31 existing and a further 3 new members) – approx. 25% of our Planned Givers.

Should you wish to join our Planned Giving Scheme – which may be either by standing order or by the Green Envelope Scheme (which is placed in the offertory when you attend Church) - please either complete one of the Giving in Grace leaflets available in the foyer and pop it in my pigeon hole, or speak to me after the 10.30 Service on Sundays.

Regular giving provides a security of income for the Church, and allows the PCC to plan realistically to continue and expand our mission.

The PCC, and myself, are extremely grateful for the generous support provided to the Church through the Planned Giving Scheme

Three final thoughts, however:

- 1. We cannot continue to rely on the generosity, and ability, of occasional givers to balance our budget
- 2. We have had a very encouraging and generous response to our request to our committed givers to prayerfully consider their ability to increase their giving we cannot hope or expect to them to be able to draw deeper into the well in the future
- 3. Our choice therefore seems to be to re-examine our expenditure, or increase our resources. We have to grow the Church, and the generosity of those within it!!

Buildings and Grounds Committee

This year has seen two major projects undertaken. The first in November was the installation of solar panels on the Millennium Centre roof and the second, more recently, the refurbishment of the Vicar's vestry.

During the year a number of other works have been completed including provision of new front doors to the Millennium Centre, redecorating of the Garden Rooms and laying of a new carpet, replacement of the light bulbs in the Millennium Hall ceiling and installation of improved lighting for the car park.

As always I am very grateful to the small band of volunteers for who give so much of their time to look after the day to day repairs and maintenance of the buildings and grounds. Never a week goes by when their services are not required.

In January the Cherry trees at All Saints' and the Beech trees at Salutation Hall were pruned by a qualified arborist. It had been hoped that the arborist would have been able to carry out selective pruning of the Silver Birch, at the front of the church, as there was concern over falling branches but this was not possible. The tree is covered by a Tree Preservation Order and so permission is required from Darlington Borough Council before any work can be carried out. Following inspection by the Council consent was refused.

Every Sunday when we come to worship we take it for granted that the church will be clean, neat and tidy but this is only possible because of the work of the church cleaners. To everybody on the church cleaning rota I would like to say thank you. We are always looking for new volunteers to join the rota and especially so this year, as over the last twelve months we have lost three members, so please give some consideration to joining the team.

Finally, I would like to thank all members of the Buildings and Grounds Committee for their support and invaluable advice throughout the last year.

Salutation Hall continues to be a valuable asset for the parish not only being used by many groups within the church but also for external groups and parties.

We have a number of regular users of the hall including Brownies, Circle Dancing, Keep Fit, Karate and Pilates. In addition, the Hall has been used 25 times during the year for parties.

Rental income in the year was £5,799, which against costs of £3,152 produced a surplus of £2,647. The majority of the costs are those associated with heat and light, insurance and the provision of the caretaker.

2016 promises to be an interesting year as we are currently talking to potential users of the Hall who may wish to use it on a 5-day weekly basis.

Many thanks to Dee Wastnedge who continues with her very efficient running of the bookings system and the rest of the committee of Colin Price, David Curran and Sally Johnson who help in its running. Also thanks to Gary Fowler for his work as caretaker.

All Saints' Millennium Centre Trust (Darlington) Limited

The Millennium Centre is run by an independent charitable company which is limited by guarantee. The land on which the Centre is built is leased for 99 years (from 1997) to the company by the church; and to be a member of the company one has to be a member of the parish electoral roll. There are 12 Trustees: The Vicar, seven nominated by the PCC one nominated by the Bishop of Durham, one nominated by the Mayor of Darlington, one nominated by the senior ward councillor, and one nominated by Evolution: The Council for Voluntary Services. Again, all trustees have to be members of the company and thereby also members of the parish electoral roll.

We are grateful to all of those who served as Trustees over the past twelve months and we are particularly grateful for the contributions of Dee Wastnedge, the Bookings Secretary; Pam Davison, the Finance Director; and Alison Barker, the Company Secretary. We certainly couldn't manage without them.

The Millennium Centre remains busy, though with costs escalating, especially the cost of fuel, we cannot be complacent about the finances. We also lost several regular bookings over the course of the year, although we are still fortunate in having a breadth of groups and activities in the Centre. Some of the many groups using the Centre are parish organisations; some are groups that are associated with the church; and others are community-based or private initiatives. In an average week, several hundred people of different ages can be using our facilities. To maintain the popularity of the Millennium Centre, it is vital that we sustain very high standards of provision. The constant use of the centre means that regular maintenance is needed, and we also need to look to developing and replacing existing fabric as wear and tear take their toll.

The Trustees have an enviable partnership with the PCC and Church, and one of the most wonderful parts of this from the Trustees' perspective is the work done by the PCC's Buildings and Grounds Committee. We are grateful for the latter taking care of all the day-to-day upkeep of the building with great effect.

Towards the end of 2015, we were able to fit Solar-PV panels to the roof of the Millennium Centre, following receipt of a very generous donation to cover that cost. Thank you to the donor, and thank you too to Colin Price for his hard work in getting everything in place for the fitting of the panels in a very short space of time. The panels generate electricity which can be used in the centre, and any excess is fed in to the grid which brings a payment to the Trust. The use of solar panels is also an important part of the church showing proper concern for the environment, and seeking to be good stewards of God's created world.

The Church community of All Saints established the Trust to build and run the Centre as a way of furthering its own vision to make this community more like God's kingdom than it otherwise would be. The All Saints' Millennium Centre remains an excellent example of how the Church contributes to the well-being of our

society in ways that are often overlooked but which make a positive difference to countless people. Though a separate company, the Millennium Centre and its Millennium Trust represent a gift from God.

6. Wider Church and Synod Reports

Deanery Synod & Group Council Report

The first Synod meeting of 2015 was held at Walkington House. Members were reminded of the new Diocesan mission statement "Blessing our Communities", which has three main priorities, namely; **Poverty, Young People and Growth,** and were asked to split into their respective "Groups", before providing feedback around three main areas; Things that are going well, Things that are going less well and Areas for development. Other important items covered during this meeting were: the Deanery Pilgrimage at Brancepeth on 16 May, the Confirmation on 3 June at St Mark's and the need to re-visit the "Deanery Plan".

The summer meeting of Synod was held at Cuthbert House, the new Diocesan office near Durham. Members were given a guided tour of the Resource Centre and received a short presentation on the work that it undertakes. The Area Dean provided a detailed report of the Deanery Pilgrimage, which had been attended by over 80 people. The remainder of the meeting was devoted to the ongoing work around the "Deanery Plan", the new Diocesan structure and the Diocesan elections.

An extra meeting of Synod was held at St James the Great in September to discuss the content of the "Deanery Plan". Unfortunately, it was not possible to present a "final draft" of the document, but members were given the opportunity to look at the supplementary paper and suggest appropriate amendments. The "Plan" incorporated proposals to merge the "Standing" and "Mission and Pastoral" committees and to form new ones, whose focus would be on the three Diocesan priorities.

Miss Christine Large (Headteacher of St John's C of E Academy) was the main speaker at the final Synod meeting of the year. Christine talked about the Academy and more specifically the "Prayer Garden", the idea for which had been instigated by some of the pupils, who had asked for a quiet place for reflection and prayer. The PTA had helped with the fund-raising and a local shop had also made a generous donation. Some pupils spoke about the project and this was followed by a Q & A session. Further discussions then ensued in order to approve the final draft of the "Deanery Plan".
